

Geyer Named Chief of Police; Derechailo Retires

Aberdeen has promoted Deputy Chief of Police Alan Geyer to Chief, following the retirement of Rick Derechailo, who had led the department since January 2019.

"While we are saddened to see Chief Derechailo leave, we are very pleased to have another true professional and longtime member of the force, Deputy Chief Geyer, take the reins of our growing department, which now has 43 sworn officers," said Township Manager Bryan A. Russell.

Geyer has served in numerous capacities since joining the Aberdeen Police Department as a Patrol Officer in 1987. In 1995, he was promoted to Detective, followed by promotions to Sergeant in 2000, Traffic Sergeant in 2002, Lieutenant in 2006, Captain of Operations in 2013, and Deputy Chief in 2020. Along the way, his numerous responsibilities included supervising the SRO and L.E.A.D. programs for the Matawan-Aberdeen Regional School District. Geyer continues to direct the SRO and L.EA.D. programs. He holds an Associate of Applied Science degree in Criminal Justice from Thomas Edison University, and attended the FBI's Mid Atlantic L.E.E.D.S. Supervision School. Geyer's community service activities have included serving as a Little League Baseball coach for a number of years.

"The Council has the upmost confidence in Alan Geyer as our new Chief of Police," said Deputy Mayor Joseph Martucci. "His length of service and experience in different areas of the department have prepared Chief Geyer for this new position. We look forward to working with him."

Derechailo, meanwhile, retires after more than 36 years with the department, joining in 1985 as a patrol officer. He rose through the ranks to become a Detective in 1990, a Sergeant assigned to the Patrol



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Council Goes to Bat For Senior Vaccines

Coming to the aid of township seniors who were unable to access COVID-19 vaccine registration via state or other online systems, the Aberdeen Council worked with the Monmouth County Department of Aging and the town's legislative partners to line up appointments for Aberdeen's most vulnerable residents.

The process began with a reverse-911 call from Mayor Fred Tagliarini that led to vaccine requests from approximately 350 residents over age 65. After learning of an initial allotment of 75 vaccines from the county, Mayor Tagliarini, Deputy Mayor Joseph Martucci and Councilwoman Margaret Montone took over the council chambers and collectively called 300 residents. To date, they were able to secure more than 200 appointments at a county facility in Freehold Township.

"Happily, a number of the folks we called that day had already made other arrangements to get their shots," Mayor Tagliarini said. "We will continue this process as more vaccines become available through the county or other resources, and will not rest until we know that every person on that list of seniors has been vaccinated."




More Road Improvement Projects on Tap Throughout Town

As work is wrapped up on several 2020 projects that were delayed by weather and contractor staffing issues associated with COVID-19, the Aberdeen Town Council has released its roster of road improvements funded under the 2021 budget.

"The township's 2021 road program includes four milland-pave projects in the Oakshades section, as well as three full reconstructions of aging roads in Strathmore," said Councilman Arthur Hirsch. "Additionally, the phased mill-and-pave projects started in past years on Cliffwood Avenue and County Road will be fully completed from endto-end on both streets this year. Both projects have been funded by the New Jersey Department of Transportation-(DOT)."

In Oakshades, mill-and-pave projects have been budgeted for Gaston Street, Gerard Avenue, Sunnybrook Place and Highfield Avenue, with work expected to be completed by late-summer or fall. A similar timetable is anticipated for completing the water main replacement and mill-andpave of Atlantic Avenue in front of Matawan Regional High School. Mill-and-pave projects involve removal (milling) of 2-3 inches of old pavement and then repaving with 2-3 inches of new asphalt.

Road reconstructions have been budgeted for Ardmore Lane, Asbury Lane and Iona Place. Construction is projected to begin as early as this fall, but most likely next spring. These projects typically include excavation and pavement reconstruction extending down 14 inches from the roadway; replacement of curbs, sidewalks and driveway aprons; and storm sewer improvements.

Residents on all affected streets will receive hand-delivered notices from township engineer, CME Associates, advising of the scope of the work and approximate timetable. Daily updates on road closures can be obtained via Nixle and are also available on Aberdeen's website and Facebook page.

Meanwhile, from the township's 2020 road program, reconstructions of Cornell Way and Courtland Lane remain in process, with work anticipated to be completed by this summer.

"These projects go a long way to repairing some of Aberdeen's worst roads, but the Township Council still has a lot more work to do," said Councilman Greg Cannon. "We've already submitted our 2022 grant requests and begun planning for next year's budget to ensure funding continues to go to the places that need it the most around town."





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Three Parks Targeted for Improvements in 2021

Continuing the multi-year initiative to revitalize all neighborhood parks throughout town, Aberdeen's Council and Parks & Recreation Department have set their sights on Ross Field, Midland Park and Cambridge Park for this year's round of capital projects.

At Ross Field in Cliffwood Beach, the town will replace all play equipment and the swing set; reconstruct and color coat the basketball court, and install new backboards; perform drainage improvements/stabilization in the area between the basketball court and Cliffwood Avenue; add a table and benches; and construct a new walkway to play area. According to Township Manager Bryan Russell, work could start by June and be completed by mid- to late-summer.

A similar timetable is also anticipated for the latest project at Midland Park in Cliffwood, which will also be getting a new name (see story below). Plans call for the full reconstruction of the park's two adjoining full-court basketball courts, including new standards and backboards; installation of an Omni Net or similar playscape structure, along with a new safety surface, timber tie curbing and sidewalk to the play area. Additionally, new drainage (mulch) will be installed, and trees will be trimmed.

Finally, at Cambridge Park (which adjoins the Lloyd Road School), a Phase 1 project will add new stairs, drainage and fencing between the park and the school's parking lot. Work is expected to get under way around May 1 and be completed within 4-6 weeks, depending on the weather, Russell said.

"We are pleased to undertake these latest projects, which underscore our Council's commitment to making all 16 township parks more enjoyable places for residents of all ages," said Councilwoman Connie Kelley, who serves on the Council's Parks & Recreation Committee with Mayor Fred Tagliarini and Councilwoman Margaret Montone.



Midland Park To Be Renamed for Former Mayor/Freeholder/Judge

Midland Park will be getting more than new basketball courts, a new playscape and other improvements this year: it will also be renamed for one of Aberdeen's most prominent citizens, Philip N. Gumbs.

Gumbs, who passed away in 2005 at the age of 82, lived in the Cliffwood section for most of his life. Back in the mid-1970s, he gained the distinctions of becoming Aberdeen's first African-American Mayor, as well as Monmouth County's first African-American Freeholder and Judge.

He entered public service as a member of the Matawan Board of Education and was elected to the Aberdeen Township Council in 1972, serving as Mayor from 1974 to 1975. Concurrently, he was elected to the Monmouth County Board of Freeholders in 1974 and was named Freeholder Director in 1975. He remained in the county post until 1976, when Governor Brendan Byrne appointed him as a workers' compensation judge. He remained on the bench in Monmouth, Ocean, Middlesex, Essex and Passaic counties before retiring from Ocean County in 2001 as supervising judge of compensation.

A 1942 graduate of Matawan Regional High School, Gumbs went on to serve in the Army Air Forces until 1945. After his discharge, Gumbs attended John Marshall College in Jersey City, now part of Seton Hall University. He went on to Rutgers University Law School, where he spent a year before transferring to Lincoln University in Missouri.

The longtime member of the St. Mark A.M.E. Zion Church in Aberdeen is survived by his wife, Rachel, two children and three grandchildren.

"Philip Gumbs distinguished himself in all facets of his life," recalled Councilman Robert Swindle, who knew Gumbs for 45 years. "Beyond his many accomplishments as a civic leader in Aberdeen Township and Monmouth County, and during his 25 years as a judge, Philip was a devoted husband and father, active member of his church and a role model for the African-American community. Renaming this park to Philip N. Gumbs Park is a fitting tribute to this son of Cliffwood."

Mayor Fred Tagliarini added: "We, on the Council, look forward to celebrating this most-deserved name change as soon as the state allows larger outdoor gatherings. Given the family's popularity in the community, we expect a huge turnout for the official unveiling of the new sign bearing Philip Gumbs' name."



Department Spotlight

Parks and Recreation Puts the Fun in Aberdeen for People of All Ages

The township's Parks and Recreation Department works hard so Aberdeen residents can play.

Whether manicuring fields, overseeing park renovations, organizing programs, or facilitating events, Director Jim Colabelli's team tirelessly toils behind the scenes to plan activities for kids, adults and seniors.

Weekend warriors playing a pickup game down at Veteran's Memorial Park, kids splashing around at the Spray Park, seniors pushing through a yoga session at Hudson Ridge, families attending the summer concert series or outdoor movies, and many others can thank the four-member Recreation Department each time they participate in their favorite sport or activity in Aberdeen.

"Our philosophy is to provide free or low-cost recreational services for those folks who are looking for something different to do," Colabelli said.

A perfect example of the innovative programing the Recreation Department provides is the Summer Adventures Program, which takes kids to museums, libraries and other fun destinations. "It is probably one of the most diverse, least expensive programs that you can get into because every day we go on a trip," Colabelli said. "Just as there is with school, there's a bus pickup and drop-off. Not very many communities have that." At the core of the department's work, however, is the upkeep of the township's 16 parks. It's an exhausting, never-ending endeavor to maintain the fields and the playground equipment.

"That's a great service to the township," Councilwoman Connie Kelley said. "Those facilities get used a lot by our residents, and the Parks and Recreation Department does an outstanding job keeping them in shape."

of distinguished service in his wake. His department played a vital role in the birth and boom of the annual Aberdeen Day celebration and has been instrumental in helping the annual Fourth of July fireworks display skyrocket.

The thing he will miss most, however, is the HAM program, which is coordinated with neighboring Holmdel, Matawan and Hazlet. It has provided year-round recreational programming for individuals with developmental disabilities such as Down syndrome, cerebral palsy and autism for more than 30 years.

"The most rewarding part of this job is working with folks that have special needs, and just seeing the look on their faces," he said. "They do not forget your name. They know me and all the other people that are there for them. And until COVID-19, they always want to come up and give you a hug, and just let you know that they appreciate what you do for them. But I appreciate them more than they appreciate me, believe me."

Colabelli's last day on the job is scheduled for June 30. Although a replacement for Colabelli was not named as this issue went to press, the township has moved former Public Information Officer Brittany Shea into a full-time role as Assistant Director of Recreation, where she will focus on special events. "Brittany has done a tremendous job coordinating the Summer Concert Series and other special events over the past few years," said Township Manager Bryan Russell. "We look forward to her working in this dedicated, full-time position."

Colabelli and Shea are joined on the Town Hall Recreation staff by support staff Patti Geyer and Michele Hausmann.

Reflecting on Colabelli's career, Mayor Fred Tagliarini said: "We are very proud of the work that Jim has done for this township. We will miss him and will think about him every Aberdeen Day, every Fourth of July and whenever there's an event that he helped create or build. He was Aberdeen, through and through."

With the township's customary Easter Egg hunt again on pause due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Aberdeen's Mayor and Township Council kept the tradition and spirt alive for the second consecutive year through an alternative Easter Egg Hunt.

On April 1, township officials and volunteer "Easter Bunnies" placed Easter eggs on the front lawns of houses with children. All eggs were handled with gloves for the health and safety of all residents. The "Easter Bunny" delivered the eggs that day between 1 and 5 p.m., and children were asked to wait until after 6 p.m. to search for their eggs. The 189 participating families with 355 children registered for the event in advance.

"Once again, the alternative Easter egg hunt proved to be a joyful and safe experience for children and parents alike," said Mayor Fred Tagliarini. "We hope that we can return to our traditional communal hunt in 2022."

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Recycling Yields Big Dividends for Aberdeen and the Environment

Did you know that recycling is the law in New Jersey? Through education and enforcement of state laws, Aberdeen has created a robust and successful recycling program.

Since 2015, the township has received a total of \$93,143 in recycling tonnage grants from the NJ Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP). This grant money has been used for a variety of recycling program needs, including education, shredding events, recycling bins, and recycling school supplies.

"We are currently preparing the 2020 tonnage report, and it looks like we will have surpassed all of the other years in tonnage due to our educational and enforcement efforts," said Township Recycling Coordinator Catherine Morello. "The community has really stepped up compliance with the program."

Recyclables can also be dropped off at the Department of Public Works yard at 147 Lenox Road in Cliffwood Beach, Monday through Saturday, from 7:00 a.m.- 3:00 p.m. New homeowners can obtain a free Township recycling receptacle at the Public Works yard during those hours.

Items that are picked up curbside or can be brought to the Public Works yard include glass, cans, plastics, newspapers, mixed paper and bundled cardboard. For complete details on acceptable items, see the township calendar or visit the township website, **www.aberdeennj.org**.



Aberdeen Council Extends Contract of Township Manager



The Aberdeen Township Council has extended the contract of Township Manager Bryan A. Russell, awarding him a three-year employment agreement.

Russell, who serves at the pleasure of the Mayor and Township Council, joined Aberdeen in January 2020 with over 16 years' experience in municipal and state government. He is responsible for overseeing all operational and budgetary functions for the township, working in tandem with the Council, administrative staff and professionals.

"We are very pleased that Mr. Russell and the Aberdeen Council have agreed to continue our professional relationship for another three years," said Mayor Fred Tagliarini. "Bryan has demonstrated the qualities to manage our town, not only with his execution of day-today matters, but by his handling of the unique challenges presented over the past year by the pandemic."

Deputy Mayor Joseph Martucci added: "Bryan's strong communication skills and ability to develop an excellent working relationship with the Township Council, employees and professionals were critical in helping our government get things done during a time when it was anything but 'business-as-usual.' COVID dramatically changed the way our Council and employees conducted business, but also led to manpower and supply delays with contractors that impacted the timing of capital projects."

"I am honored that the Township Council has demonstrated its faith in me by extending my contract for another three years," said Russell. "I welcome this opportunity to work with the Township Council, employees, residents and businesses on making Aberdeen an even greater place to live in the years ahead."


The summer event is open to all Monmouth County residents. It follows an Aberdeensponsored shredding event (funded by the state grants) that was held on April 17.

Retired Chief Reflects on 36 Years at Aberdeen PD

The emotion began to build inside Rick Derechailo when he received his last call to return to headquarters. It reached its peak when he walked out of town hall as Police Chief for the last time.

Waiting for him outside were not only members of the Aberdeen Police Department and Town Council, but also members of the fire department, the first aid squad, the community emergency response team and fellow police chiefs from around the county. All were there to say goodbye and thank you to Derechailo after 36 years of service to Aberdeen.

"It was a very humbling experience," he said. "It was a touching way to end 36 years of service and I was very humbled by their presence there. It said a lot and I was just thankful for their presence and the respect they showed."

Derechailo was promoted to chief in 2019, marking the culmination of a long climb through the department's ranks. He started off as a patrol officer before being assigned to the detective bureau. He moved over to patrol sergeant before returning to run the bureau as detective sergeant. From there, he went from lieutenant to deputy chief to chief.

All told, he was promoted by five different police chiefs.

"What I was proudest of was being able to help people," he said. "That's what I got out of the job. We were there to protect and serve. You see a lot of good things, you see a lot of bad things. But it was just the ability to be able to help people. That's what I took away from it."

Derechailo said some of his most important work was spent visiting schools and spreading



anti-drug and anti-violence messages. He was also able to be a positive influence on the kids that he coached in the Matawan-Aberdeen baseball programs.

Not surprisingly, a handful of those ballplayers have gone on to jobs at the police department.

"The same thing happened to me," Derechailo said. "My second chief was John McGinty, and way back when I was a teenager, he was my Babe Ruth League coach. So, I've kind of come full circle in that respect. Some of the kids that I coached in their teens eventually became police officers. I hope I was some kind of role model there that they were able to follow."

He's enjoying the usual luxuries that come with retirement, such as sleeping later and taking walks with his dog. He is eager to tackle some home improvement projects, and there's enough yardwork to keep him busy for a while.

"Retirement is a bittersweet thing," Derechailo said. "I will enjoy being home more, but I will miss the camaraderie of my fellow police officers."

Security Cameras to be Rolled Out to Parks

A few months ago, a woman who had gone for a stroll along the Raritan Bay Seawall Trail in Cliffwood Beach was suffering a medical emergency. Fortunately, there are security cameras lining the path.

"The woman called 911 and was able to convey her exact location to emergency personnel using the signage we have," said Bryan Russell, Township Manager. "Police who were monitoring the camera from headquarters were able to watch her and make sure she was OK until help arrived."

Township officials wisely had safety in mind when the path was rebuilt after it had been destroyed by Superstorm Sandy in 2013. The old seawall had some cameras, but more were added when it was rebuilt. Russell said the cameras have not only proven to be an important tool in keeping residents safe, but their mere presence helps curb vandalism.

With safety and security in mind, there are now plans to install similar cameras in the township's 16 parks.

"Some of the parks already have cameras, some don't," Russell said. "So, we're going to schedule camera additions to those parks, in some cases in tandem with park renovations."

Russell said it will be a process that could take several years, but he's hoping to begin in the current fiscal year by installing them in two parks.

"The Council has invested heavily into making sure our parks are the best around," Russell said. "Our parks committee spends a lot of time to make sure the residents are getting a top-notch facility. We want to make sure our parks are protected and that's what the security cameras will do."
